Reflection

We know that a person is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ, so we also have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ and not by works of the law, because by works of the law no one will be justified.

Galatians 2:16

WE HEAR GOD SPEAK IN HIS WORD

The Sermon
Galatians: The Gospel of Freedom in Jesus Christ
"The Foundational Gospel"
Galatians 1:11-24
Rev. Alex Woods

¹¹I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that the gospel I preached is not of human origin. ¹²I did not receive it from any man, nor was I taught it; rather, I received it by revelation from Jesus Christ. ¹³For you have heard of my previous way of life in Judaism, how intensely I persecuted the church of God and tried to destroy it. ¹⁴I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people and was extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers. ¹⁵But when God, who set me apart from my mother's womb and called me by his grace, was pleased ¹⁶ to reveal his Son in me so that I might preach him among the Gentiles, my immediate response was not to consult any human being. ¹⁷I did not go up to Jerusalem to see those who were apostles before I was, but I went into Arabia. Later I returned to Damascus.

¹⁸ Then after three years, I went up to Jerusalem to get acquainted with Cephas and stayed with him fifteen days. ¹⁹ I saw none of the other apostles—only James, the Lord's brother. ²⁰ I assure you before God that what I am writing you is no lie. ²¹ Then I went to Syria and Cilicia. ²² I was personally unknown to the churches of Judea that are in Christ. ²³ They only heard the report: "The man who formerly persecuted us is now preaching the faith he once tried to destroy." ²⁴ And they praised God because of me.

The Big Idea: Often we fall to the temptation of wanting something more than the gospel. In our text, the Galatians believe they need something more than the gospel, that salvation equals Jesus plus following the Mosaic law. Paul responds by telling them that the gospel is not only for the beginning of the Christian life, but the whole of the Christian life. And to be a Christian, we must remember that the gospel is the foundation of our life as well. And to keep the gospel as the foundation of our Christian life, we must remember its source, its essence, and its purpose.

Questions for personal reflection and family/Community Group discussion:

- 1. How did God use the ordinary means of grace in corporate worship to encourage, comfort, convict, or challenge you in your relationship with Him?
- 2. Why can it be so easy to stray from the foundational truths of the gospel? How were the Galatians doing so? How do we do so in our own time?
- 3. How can our desire to go "beyond the gospel" show a misunderstanding of the gospel?
- 4. Take a moment and read Jeremiah 1:4-5. How do Paul's words in Galatians 1:15-16 echo the words in Jeremiah? Why might this be significant? What might Paul be signaling about the significance and legitimacy of his gospel ministry and preaching?
- 5. Read Galatians 1:13–16 one more time. Why was Paul's conversion and apostolic call so utterly astounding and unexpected? What can we infer about God as we consider Paul's conversion? What are the implications for our own relationship with God?
- 6. Read John 12:27-28. As Jesus faced the cross, what was his ultimate concern? How might the gospel help us to live for God's glory?

Prayer Prompt: As you conclude, take some time to consider the wonder of Paul's conversion and call—as well as the miracle of your own! Thank God for his effectual call—for the way he made your dead heart come alive to repentance and faith in his Son. Finally, spend some time asking God to strengthen you to stand courageously against teachings, influences, and impulses within your own heart that would do damage to the free gospel of grace.
